Message from the Director

The Port Lincoln Clontarf Academy has continued to grow and provide opportunities for our young men to be successful both inside and outside of the classroom. The start of 2023 has seen the academy grow from 45 young men in 2022, to an incredible 64 fellas engaged in the program from Years 7-12. Since the end of 2021, the academy has over doubled its enrollments which is a fantastic result for all involved.

As an academy, we had 64 young men engaged over the term, with 38 students averaging 80% and above. This is a tremendous effort by these young men and a reflection of their hard work across Term 2.

The academy, in partnership with Port Lincoln High School, works with students to ensure retention until the end of Year 12 and then into employment. Using supportive relationships, a welcoming environment and a diverse range of activities, the young Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander men in our programme develop improved self-esteem and confidence which assists them to

participate in education, employment and society in a positive way.

A quick look across our Term 2 planner shows that our boys have been engaged in a variety of activities that have resulted in positive outcomes, including Worksite Visits, Health Sessions, Primary School Clinics, Morning Trainings as well as camps in Port Lincoln and Ceduna. My personal highlight of the term was our Mothers Day morning tea in Week 2. It was great to have all of the special woman in the lives our young men in their space together.

As we approach Term 3, we are excited for what we have planned for academy members, in particular our Senior Employment Forum in Week 3.

Please feel encouraged to get on board with our Morning Training sessions, Afterschool Activities and Good Bloke Lunch's as all activities are a great way to strengthen your relationship with our Academy members.

We then headed out to Koonibba Mission to run a clinic at the local Primary School which was filled with many laughs and strong leadership from all Academy Members. Following

the PS clinic, we headed back to Ceduna for the inaugural Port Lincoln vs Ceduna Football Game. After a strong showing from both sides, Ceduna came away with an 11 point win. We look forward to many more interactions with our new Ceduna Academy.









Yr 9 & 10 Reward & Engagement Camp

Thursday and Friday of Week 8 we held a local overnight camp for some of our Year 9 & 10 men. We used this camp as a way to reward and engage those coming along while also looking to provide first time opportunities in an employment space, as well as looking to re-establish some relationships throughout our Year 9 cohort who have had some challenges in this area throughout the term.

We started the camp off with a fantastic worksite visit to Gazanda Oysters out in Little Douglas. This was a highly engaging and hands on worksite visit that gave the fellas a great insight into the industry. They were even lucky enough to have plenty of oysters shucked in front of them, much to Tate Shillabeers delight! Following our visit we headed out to the Port Lincoln National Park for a fish, however it seems the fish were away on holiday and are due back next week...

Due to the severe weather we had to go to plan B and stay in the academy room overnight, which for all of the boys on this camp was a first. Dinner at the Boston Hotel, followed by Thursday night footy, table tennis, board games and a movie to finish off the night made for a great first day.

Friday morning, we were up early for a cooked breakfast before heading out to Fisheries Bay to complete a beach clean-up. The weather was magic and the boys did an outstanding job with the clean-up. We finished the camp with Mini Putt and a BBQ out at Glen Forest Animal Park.

Our boys led from the front showing great support for one another and getting out of their comfort zone with their public speaking and giving positive direction with their activities.

We are lucky enough to have a garden bed outside of the Academy, thanks to our partners at Port Lincoln Bunnings store. It was that time of year to get rid of a few of the old growth and plant a new patch of veggies. Gloves were out, garden shovels were deep into the soil and a new lot of veggies were ready to go. Our Year 8 fellas are hoping to get some fresh carrot, broccoli, celery and cauliflower over the coming months.





Morning Training

Morning Training has continued to be a big highlight this term with average numbers between the low-mid's 20s. While the lower school engagement in Morning Training has been strong, it has also been great to see some Year 11 boys continuing to engage in the sessions. We have had an extremely wet and cold term, with only one training across the entire term not being on a wet and rainy morning so to have those numbers with the weather encountered is a great outcome.
