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Message from the Director

The Port Lincoln Clontarf Academy has continued to grow and provide opportunities for our young men to be successful through many avenues. 2023 has seen the academy grow again, taking our total number to 64 fellas engaged in the program from Years 7- 12 with an average attendance of 82% across the year.

The Academy, in partnership with Port Lincoln High School, works with students to ensure retention until the end of Year 12 and then into employment. Using supportive relationships, a welcoming environment and a diverse range of activities, the young Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander men in our programme develop improved self-esteem and confidence which assists them to participate in education, employment and society in a positive way.

Academy staffing has taken on a new look this year with inaugural Port Lincoln Academy Director Matthew Stokes coming back the work for the foundation alongside Derick Wanganeen as our Operations Officer's.

A quick look across our year shows that the boys have been involved in weekly early morning training sessions and breakfasts, after school activities, camps, football and basketball activities, worksite visits, health checks, community activities and obtained casual employment.

We would like to thank the Port Lincoln community and all local and national partners for your ongoing support which allows us to run such a fantastic program for our young men.

Year 9, 10 & 11 Streaky Bay Surfing Camp

It was great to have our young men in Years 9-11 on a three-day camp to Streaky Bay in Week 8. Thanks to the high level of engagement in the program throughout Term 1, we were able to take 18 young men on this camp, which was a fantastic result.

The camp offered a range of engaging activities and opportunities to strengthen our relationships, including community activities, surfing, fishing, hiking, and evening cricket sessions. Surfing lessons at the amazing Sceale Bay were a highlight, creating lifelong memories for our young men as they bonded with their peers. Our evening cricket games were filled with laughter and showcased the true Clontarf Spirit.

A personal highlight was our community beach clean at the caravan park. It was incredible to witness others staying at the park approach our young men and commend them for their efforts. Our students took the opportunity to explain what Clontarf is all about, showcasing their pride in the academy. This interaction was truly special and a testament to their commitment.







Morning Training

Morning training sessions have been a massive hit this year for Port Lincoln Clontarf Academy. On average, 20 young men have been attending our sessions before school, with many of them being ready for 6:30am pick ups.

These sessions are designed to give our young men an engaging and rewarding incentive before school, which is then followed by showers and a delicious cooked breakfast to start their day in the most positive way possible and make sure they have the energy they need to have a successful day at school.

NFL was the biggest hit among academy members this year, with some highly skilled and competitive games bringing a high level of engagement for all. Always with Clontarf Spirit of course!









Year 12 Leadership Camp

In Week 5, our Year 12 students from across South Australia traveled to Adelaide for their Year 12 Leadership Camp. All four of our Year 12 students participated in the camp, which was a positive start. The camp aimed to emphasize the value and importance of Year 12 and solidify their commitment for 2023.

During our workshops, our Year 12 students from all over the state developed the following pledge. They all signed this pledge together, and it will be displayed in all academies throughout the state.

"WE COMMIT TO BEING GOOD BLOKES, SHOWING LEADERSHIP AND RESPECT. WE COMMIT TO HAVING A POSITIVE ATTITUDE AND MAKING GOOD CHOICES. WE WILL ATTEND SCHOOL, SET AND ACHIEVE OUR GOALS. WE WILL HAVE THE COURAGE TO STAY ON THE RIGHT PATH AND ENSURE THAT WE FINISH YEAR 12."

In addition to the pledge and goal setting, this camp also included engaging and enjoyable activities for our Year 12 students before they return to school. Our young men participated in paintball in the Adelaide Hills, surfing lessons in Victor Harbour, the inaugural Murray Bridge Clontarf Academy AFL game, and a fantastic super training session with over 50 staff from our partners in Adelaide and the surrounding area.







After School Activities

Similar to training, our after-school activities have again been a massive hit this year, and our young men have engaged in a variety of activities including cooking, fishing, basketball, worksite visits, sandboarding, health sessions, football, life skills sessions, community activities, and academic catch-up sessions!



Employment & Worksite Visits

A key pillar of ours here at Clontarf is employment. Not only do we want to ensure we are developing our young men to be ready to enter the workforce successfully upon completion of Year 12, we also want to ensure we are exposing them to a variety of different industries throughout their schooling years. In 2023, we have over 20 of our young men in Years 9-12 engaged in part-time/casual work, which is an amazing outcome.

This year, we ran a variety of worksite visits including Bunnings, Fulton Hogan, Civil Construction, and Gazander Oysters to get hands-on experience in the seafood industry, as we live in the seafood capital of Australia. In Term 3, we engaged in a project with our local Bunnings to design and make a guitar rack for the guitars we have in the Academy Room that were without a home.

During the first session, we headed off to Bunnings, where the boys had to work their way through the store, collecting all of the necessary materials as per their individual lists. They were then split into groups and had to measure out all of the PVC pipe they collected to the required measurements.

A fortnight later, Bunnings came to the Port Lincoln Academy Room for the second session of the project. We set up the Academy Room with some makeshift workbenches before cutting up the PVC pipe, gluing the fittings into place, and adding the finishing touches to the guitar rack.

This was a great hands-on project for our young boys that provided them with a variety of new skills while also growing their relationship with our local Bunnings team.



Health Checks

In Terms 3 and 4, we placed a strong emphasis on Health Checks for our Port Lincoln Academy. We scheduled consecutive appointments at Port Lincoln Aboriginal Health Service from Wednesday to Friday morning in Week 7 of Term. Additionally, in Week 5 of Term 4, PLAHS visited us at Port Lincoln High School to finalize the remaining checks.

We are extremely proud to have completed over 50 checks this year and we are grateful for our ongoing partnership with PLAHS.

This achievement is a wonderful result for our program and the wider Port Lincoln community. We anticipate further development of this event in the coming year.




Alumni Good News Story

Employment Forum

Week 3 marked our annual Employment Forum for all of our Year 11 and 12 students across South Australia. This year, the forum was again held in Adelaide at the West Lakes Resort. It was great to see all 12 Year 11 and 12 students commit to the week-long camp.

The first day was packed with activities at the Port Adelaide Football Club, including a Financial Literacy session, Mock Interviews, and Port Adelaide star Willie Rioli from the Port Adelaide Football Club joining us to have a chat with the boys. He spoke about his schooling and Clontarf journey up until his AFL career, highlighting how important education and finishing Year 12 is. Following our sessions at PAFC, we split off into groups for worksite visits at Flinders Port Holding, Australia Post — Startrack, Fulton Hogan, and Bunnings Warehouse.

On Thursday morning, over 20 different Clontarf Partners joined us for breakfast and the Employment Forum at The Lakes Resort Hotel. Ethan Taylor, who is a Clontarf Alumni, was the Master of Ceremonies for the event and was one of three guest speakers to be interviewed by Ocean View Academy Director Peter Rolfe. The other two guest speakers were former GWS Giant and Adelaide Crows player Curtley Hampton and Whyalla Alumni Terrelle Colson.

Upon completion of the forum, we headed to the Glenelg Football Club for the official State of Origin

It was amazing to see our young men from Port Lincoln step out of their comfort zone and engage with partners in a respectful manner, listening to the opportunities that may lie ahead within the businesses and even handing out resumes and business cards to those who sparked an interest.


Major Trip - Darwin
