

# Message from the Director

The Port Lincoln Clontarf
Academy has had a successful,
fun, and engaging Term 1 both
inside and outside the
classroom. This term has seen us
engage an incredible 66 fellas in
the programme from Years 7-12.
Since the end of 2021, the
academy has more than doubled
its enrollments, which is a
fantastic result for all involved.

As an academy, we had 66 young men engaged over the term, with an average attendance of 83%. This is a tremendous effort by these young men and a reflection of their hard work across Term 1.

The academy, in partnership with Port Lincoln High School, works with students to ensure retention until the end of Year 12 and then into employment. Using supportive relationships, a welcoming environment, and a diverse range of activities, the young Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander men in our programme develop improved self-esteem and confidence,

which assists them to participate in education, employment, and society in a positive way.

A quick look across our Term 1 planner shows that our boys have been engaged in a variety of activities that have resulted in positive outcomes, including worksite visits, 29 Contact Time sessions, 14 morning trainings, after school activities, as well as camps in Adelaide, Farm Beach, Port Lincoln, Streaky Bay, and a Big Day Out to Elliston.

As we approach Term 2, we are excited about what we have planned for academy members, particularly our Year 8 Football Carnival to Port Augusta and annual Health Checks.

Please feel encouraged to get on board with our morning training sessions, after school activities, and Good Bloke Lunches, as all activities are a great way to strengthen your relationship with our academy members.

# Year 12 Leadership Camp

The leadership camp is always a favourite for our Year 12s to reinforce Clontarf values, set the 2024 academy pledge, enjoy some fun activities as they work towards the end of their schooling life, and moving on to employment or further study.

The camp began with the boys up early for a Partners Training, which was fantastic for our boys to talk and socialise with our partners around employment pathways and career choices. We then moved to the Adelaide Football Club where the boys were able to listen to Jeremy Johncock and Izak Rankine talk about working and playing at an AFL club. While at the Crows facilities our boys workshopped their employment pathway but most importantly their pledge for 2024, outlining their goals and standards to finish high school. To finish off the day, we were able to spend a couple of hours at Glenelg Beach enjoying the sun and surf.

Day 3 started with a lot of anticipation, as we headed out to Murray Bridge for some paintballing. Wesley, Brodie, and Dre directed a lot of banter towards Derick and Stokesy as we drove out to the paintball field. As the battle began, both sides were keen to take the upper hand. Unfortunately for the students, their mentors had the last laugh with some outstanding war play. A worksite visit to Thomas Foods was next, where students were shown multi-dimensional employment roles, including electricians, meat packers, butchers, and admin. To conclude, we were treated with a cultural activity by Harley Hall to make boomerangs. We would like to thank Harley for taking the time to share his experiences with our young men.

Concluding camp with a game of football at Hackham Football Club, our young men were able to showcase their skills to enhance their selection chances for State of Origin later in the year. All of our young men acquitted themselves magnificently and demonstrated high leadership skills across the camp, placing them in a great place for success in 2024.

Our Year 7 fellas had the opportunity to finish the term with an academy sleepover for their much-anticipated Induction Camp. The morning started with a little physical activity with our weekly morning training session capped off with a hot meal in preparation for a massive day ahead.

We teamed up with the local SAPOL Officers, Allan Miller, Coen Taylor and Swayne Ackland, for a visit to the Port Lincoln Police Station. The lads were terrific while touring the facilities, asked good questions and displaying all the behaviours and values that make them such a great group of young men. The fellas got the chance sit in the

Courthouse and blast the sirens in one of the cop cars. Most importantly it was great to hear the many opportunities of employment if this was a pathway the fellas would like to pursue post high school.

It is very important our lads get the chance to display their leadership and getting out into the community for a beach clean-up is a super positive way of doing that. We spent an hour walking along the foreshore of North Shields beach and packed our plastic bags with a bunch of rubbish that either washed ashore or from people who had littered. We talked about being a good bloke on a daily basis and for some of our

academy members this was the first time they have participated in an activity like this. It was great to see them enjoy giving back to our community.

Winding up a jam-packed morning we whipped out our fishing rods and patiently waited for some nibbles on our tasty bait. Ethan Retallick and Lindsey Mclean jagged a few little tommies and walked away victorious with the most fish caught for the day. Before dinner and free time, we had a conversation around the values and expectations of a Clontarf fella attending Port Lincoln High School and what that looks like. The journey over the next few years to get to Year 12, graduate and land

themselves in an employment space that they will thrive in was also discussed.

To conclude the Year 7 Induction Camp, it was time for a maze run and a competitive 18 holes of mini golf. # Alumni Good News Story - Continued


